"Planting Sequoias: Why Healing the Body of Christ Should Start Close to Home . . . and Why it Will Take a Long Time "

John D. Roth

The year 2010 is the 150th anniversary of the founding of both the Mennonite Brethren and General Conference Mennonite Churches. In that context, historian John D. Roth will offer perspectives on issues of division and unity within the Mennonite world.

John D. Roth is a professor of history at Goshen (Indiana) College, where he also serves as the director of the Mennonite Historical Library and editor of *The Mennonite Quarterly Review*. Roth has written and edited numerous books, including *Anabaptism: Conversations With a Radical Tradition, Beliefs: Mennonite Faith and Practice, Stories: How Mennonites Came to Be, Practices: Mennonite Worship and Witness,* and *Choosing Against War: A Christian View*.
